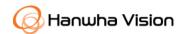

Federal Grants



DOJ Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS) School Violence Prevention Program (SVPP):

- Competitive award program
- Grants are up to \$500k schools must provide a 25% match



Nonprofit Security Grant Program (NSGP) is a competitive grant provides funding support:

- Target hardening and other physical security enhancements and activities to nonprofits
- Organizations at high risk of terrorist attack.
- Grants are up to \$150,000.


K-12 Security Technology Planning

- Schools prioritize active shooter mitigation, often through Al-driven weapons detection, though the event itself is statistically the least likely to occur.
- Integrators need to guide schools through hype and vendor influence to ensure smart investments (e.g., upgrading outdated systems before adding new tech).
- Strategic Master Planning involves all school stakeholders to create a cohesive, long-term security plan. Think quarterly or semi-annual business reviews.



Layered Approach to School Safety and Security

Best approach: Layered. Within five physical layers, a layered approach is essential to addressing a broad range of threats, as each successive layer provides specific components to deter, detect or delay and respond to adversarial behaviors in the event that other layers are bypassed or breached.


Within each layer are TIERs of security. Simply put, the first TIER provides a good baseline level of security, whereas the last TIER includes the most comprehensive approaches to K-12 security. Many schools will not be able to implement measures beyond the first and second TIER, or may not have a need to do so. The general idea is to provide school administrators with tools they can use to gauge their risk levels, identify their security needs and, after factoring in available resources and funding, develop tailored security plans that incorporate best practices and procedures.

Each layer includes basic protective components of security:

- Policies and Procedures
- People (Roles and Training)
- Architectural
- Communication
- Access Control
- Video Surveillance
- Detection & Alarm
